Superintendent proposes \$300 million budget

The county commissioners

will hold a public budget

hearing on May 14,

Superintendent James E. Richmond's operating budget proposal to the Board of Education is \$300.5 million, a funding increase of \$18.4 million or 6.5 percent. The

request is based on revenue estimates from the state of \$7.2 million and a county funding increase of \$10.4 million. These estimates are significantly lower than levels of funding provided to education in past years. This is due in part to the expiration of Bridge to Excellence

funding and the impact of the economy on county tax revenues.

The county has scheduled a public hear-

ing on requests from all county agencies, including the Board of Education, at 4:30 p.m., May 14, at the County Government Building in La Plata. Speakers must sign up

between 4-5 p.m. and will have three minutes to speak.

Richmond told the Board on April 28 that his budget submission based on a March funding compromise with county that he proposed after several meetings with Commissioners'


Carol Leveillee makes Mary H. Matula Elementary School a great place to work and learn. That's what her students say -- and the teachers and even the parents of the students.

Roberts is national winner

Steve Roberts, a mathematics teacher at Westlake High School, was recently named one of 99 national winners of the Presidential Award for Excellence Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST) for 2007 by the National Science Foundation. The award is the highest recognition that a kindergarten through grade 12 mathematics or science teacher can receive in the United States.

Roberts was chosen as an award recipient from selected mathematics and science teachers from all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

As a national recipient, Roberts received a \$10,000 grant to use over a three-year period. He also received an all-expenses paid trip to Washington D.C., to accept the award and participate in educational and celebratory events. He was honored in an awards ceremony hosted by Dr. Arden Bement, director of the National Science Foundation, on Friday, May 2.

PBIS leaders honored

More than 35 Charles County Public Schools teachers and faculty members were recognized in a Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program leadership recognition ceremony held April 21.

They were nominated by their principals for their support of the program, coordinating meetings and PBIS events for their schools, collecting program data and lesson plans, and for collaborating with parents to make the program successful.





Summer office hours

Starting June 16, offices in centers and schools that do not have extended day or community services programs are being placed on a 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. schedule. The schedule continues until August 18, when returning teachers start.

The change is expected to generate anywhere from \$100,000 to \$150,000 in energy savings. The changes will occur in half of our buildings. A listing of schools and buildings affected by the change will be released later this month.

Pension contribution raise

Contributions for eligible members of the Employees' and Teachers' Pension System will increase to 5 percent of eligible salary, beginning July 1. The contributions are automatically deducted from pay checks and those eligible for the increase currently contribute 4 percent. This does not apply to employees who are currently enrolled in the Wachovia retirement plan.

Calendar survey

A survey on the 2009-10 school calendar will be posted on the CCPS web site later this month. The Board of Education approves the school calendar two years in advance and would like input on the calendar. A pdf of the draft calendar will also be posted on the school system web site for review.

his proposal is balanced because the county has not committed to a funding number, and has changed its estimate four times during the past year.

Although negotiations are not complete, Richmond reiterated that his highest priority is compensation for all employees. The budget includes a salary reserve as well as other mandatory cost increases including health insurance, utilities and bus transportation.

"As in past years, employee compensation remains my first priority, and while I would like to see that reserve larger, it is the most I can responsibly put forth at this time without implementing additional significant budget reductions," Richmond said.

A large portion of the budget is reserved to fund opening costs for the new Mary B. Neal Elementary School and the final phase of North Point High School. Many of the operating costs have been funded by reallocating money through position transfers and deferring partial pension funding of health insurance for retires (referred to as

GASB 45 or OPEB funding.)

The budget does not advance any major new programs, but keeps current programs in place. Two new initiatives, gifted education identification and the state-mandated Bridge program for students struggling to pass the High School Assessment, are included in the budget. Savings generated in other instructional areas creates funding for these two programs.

Additionally, the superintendent's request includes a supplemental budget request totaling \$30 million if additional money becomes available. The Board is reviewing the budget proposal and supplemental budget and is expected to make a decision May 13 on what to add in their budget request to the Commissioners. However, the final funding decision rests with the Commissioners.
