In Memoriam Pominic Zaccarelli

Dominic Zaccarelli, athletic director at Westlake High School and the winningest football coach in the school's history, passed away Jan. 18, 2021.

Born Feb. 25, 1964, Zaccarelli was a 1982 graduate of La Plata High School, and earned a bachelor of science degree from the University of Maryland.

He started with the school system as a coach at Maurice J. McDonough High School in the late 1980s where he coached football, baseball and wrestling. He began his teaching career as a special education teacher at Westlake in August 1998. In 2000, he became Westlake's athletic director, a position he held until his death. In 2008, as the head football coach, he led the Wolverines to the Maryland 3A championship.

Known as "Coach Zac" by many, Zaccarelli valued athletics, but valued his students more. "He was a champion for students and a guardian of our school community," Westlake Principal Diane Roberts said. "His patience and mentorship have, and will continue to have, a grace that will impact generations."

"It wasn't only Westlake kids," said Chrystal Benson, a former principal of Westlake, who is now a Student Engagement and Conduct officer with the school system. "It was all kids around the county, the state. They all knew Coach Zac." she said.

Benson worked closely with Zaccarelli for 11 years and considered him a friend. "He paid close attention to detail," she said. "As a principal, I knew athletics was taken care of because he was in charge of it."

Zaccarelli took Mike Meiser, School Safety and Residency Administrator for CCPS, under his wing when the latter started at Westlake in 1994. "The job was always more about life then it was about work," Meiser said. "I was

so lucky to have landed a career that began with Westlake and falling under Zac's watch."

Zaccarelli mentored and encouraged students and colleagues.

"He brought so many kids and coaches to the next level and pushed them to achieve beyond their reality, but he did it through caring and relating to them," Meiser said.

He was an advocate for students, making personal calls to colleges on their behalf and following up after the student left high school.

"Once a kid got into college, Zac would make it a point to go see them play — any sport — at least one time on the college level," Benson said. "That's the man I know, that's the man we lost."

Zaccarelli served on numerous state, regional and local committees over the years for different sports and organizations

He was named to the Maryland High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame and was named Athletic Director of the Year for Maryland Public Secondary Schools Athletic Association (MPSSAA) District IV several times during his career, and was under consideration for Maryland State Athletic Directors Association (MSADA) state Athletic Director of the Year.

He served as an officer of the Southern Maryland Athletic Conference (SMAC), including as the organization's president. He was a member of the MPSSAA Board of Control.

"Westlake High School will forever be imprinted by the leadership and love of Coach Zaccarelli," Roberts said.

Meiser agreed. "Westlake, Charles County and the state of Maryland were fortunate to have someone with Zac's drive, commitment and passion for children and athletics be part of our world," he said.

Roberts appointed Director of Accountability for Charles County Public Schools

Superintendent Kimberly Hill recently announced the appointment of Steven Roberts as the Director of Accountability for Charles County Public Schools (CCPS).

Roberts, principal at Maurice J. McDonough High School, started his career with CCPS in 1997 as a mathematics teacher at Westlake High School.

He worked at Westlake until 2011 and served as the school's varsity wrestling coach, algebra team leader, mathematics department chair and school testing coordinator.

Between 2011 and 2016, Roberts worked as a vice principal at Mc-Donough and North Point High School.

He has served as McDonough's principal since 2016.

Roberts holds a master of science in curriculum and instruction with an Admin 1 from McDaniel College and a bachelor of science

in secondary education mathematics from the University of Maryland, College Park.

Roberts will begin as director of accountability on Jan. 25.

Linda Gill, executive director of schools, will serve as interim principal at McDonough during the transition.

Roberts replaces longtime director of accountability, Cliff Eichel, who retired in December.

Eichel began his CCPS career as a teacher at Thomas Stone High School in 1978 and was promoted to director of research and assessment —

later renamed director of accountability — in 2004. Eichel retired in December.

vice chairperson for two terms.

McGraw was first elected to the Board in 2014 and is serving in her second term. Prior to today's vote, McGraw served as Board chairperson for the past four years.

McGraw said she is excited to continue in a leadership role with the Board and continue her work in the best interests of students.

"The role of a Board member is to advocate for the budget and the school system. I have done that in making difficult and well-informed decisions as we face challenges of selecting a new superintendent and recovery from COVID-19. We will work toward the goals we have established to move our school system from good to great," McGraw shared in accepting the vote.

Wilson is a Gulf War veteran who retired from the U.S. Army after serving for 20 years.

She is active in the community and serves as president of the Port Tobacco River Conservancy; president of the Southern Maryland Alumni Chapter for the University of Maryland Eastern Shore; member of the McConchie One-room School House committee and member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.

She also served as the education liaison for the Charles County Branch of the NAACP for several years. Wilson earned her bachelor of science in business from the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. She is serving her first term on the Board.

McGraw is a retired Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) principal who also served as a teacher and vice principal during her 25-year career with the school system.

She was the 2009 CCPS Principal of the Year, and volunteers with Our Lady Help of Christians Catholic Church.

She is an elected member of the board of directors of the Maryland Association of School Boards.

She is also a member of the Charles County Retired School Personnel Association, the Education Association of Charles County and the Maryland State Education Association. She earned her bachelor's degree in elementary special education and her master's degree in special education. McGraw has lived in the Charles County community for more than 40 years.
