Highly qualified teachers in most CCPS classrooms

The percentage of certificated teachers in Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) for the 2007-08 school year was 95 percent, which is 9 percent higher than the state average.

The percentage of certificated teachers in CCPS increased 11 percent over the last five school years, as 84 percent of teachers were certificated in the 2003-04 school year, according to Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) 2008 Maryland Report Card statistics.

In CCPS, 95 percent of teachers hold either a standard professional certificate or an advanced professional certificate, and 5 percent have conditional licenses and are working toward full certification.

The percentage of classrooms taught by highly qualified teachers has also increased over the past five school years, from 51 percent during the 2003-04 school year, to 91 percent during the 2007-08 school year, which is 6 percent higher than the state average.

The school system attributes the increases to its focus on hiring highly qualified teacher applicants.

"Principals have made efforts at the school level to place highly qualified teachers in the subject areas of their certification and highly qualified status. This has increased the number of Charles County Public Schools classes that are being taught by highly qualified teachers," said Keith Hettel, CCPS assistant superintendent of human resources.

Teachers are deemed as highly qualified if they meet minimum requirements outlined by the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), enacted in 2002. The law requires teachers in core academic subject areas to be highly qualified in the subject area they teach.

Highly qualified teachers must have a bachelor's degree and full state certification, and be able to demonstrate content knowledge in their teaching subject area. These subjects are English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history and geography.

Highly qualified statistics reported by MSDE only include figures for teachers who teach core academic subject areas as defined by NCLB and do not reflect the percentage of teachers who are highly qualified, but teaching in subject areas not considered core academic subject areas.

NCLB also requires that teachers newly hired in Title I schools be highly qualified, as they are partially paid with federal funds. Title I is a federal education program that provides services to at-risk students in high poverty elementary schools.

CCASC to implement student driving task force in high schools

The Charles County Association of Student Councils (CCASC) addressed teen driving safety as a priority at its first meeting of the 2008-09 school year on Thursday, Oct. 4, at La Plata High School.

Student council representatives from each high school split into groups with Charles County Public Schools juvenile intervention officers to gather ideas on implementing a teen driver safety task force as part of the school system's and Charles County Sheriff's Office "We Care" teen driving safety campaign.

Each group discussed preliminary steps to

encourage student participation, such as offering athletic event incentives, staging mock accident scenes at schools, hosting monthly student assemblies and creating public service announcements

The CCASC is also considering requiring students who violate parking permit requirements to participate in the program.

CCASC members were asked to present and discuss the program with their student government associations and will revisit launching the student task force at its next meeting in December.

AFCEA grant awarded

Kathy Cahn, a science teacher at La Plata High School, was recently selected as a 2008 Science Tools Grant award recipient and will receive a \$1,000 grant from the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association (AFCEA).

Cahn is one of four \$1,000 AFCEA grant recipients in the tri-county area and plans to use the funds toward the purchase of Vernier colorimeters and dissolved oxygen probes. These probes connect to laptop computers and are used in water quality studies for tenth-grade biology and Advanced Placement biology labs.

She will be recognized Oct. 30 at a luncheon hosted by the Southern Maryland AFCEA chapter in St. Mary's County.

Smart Boards enhance instruction with touch of a screen

Charles County Public Schools is bringing student lessons into virtual light in classrooms with the use of Smart Boards and airliner tablets — interactive technology that involves visual graphics and moveable diagrams, all accessible with the touch of a finger.

Smart Boards combine the use of a computer and digital projector with an interactive whiteboard that features a touch-sensitive display. Teachers and students can use their fingers, which act as the computer's mouse, to control computer applications, write notes, pull up images and Web sites, play interactive learning games and save lesson plans. Smart Boards motivate students to learn and adapt to different learning styles of students, such as visual, auditory and kinesthetic learn-

ers. Kathy Cahn, a science teacher at La Plata High School, said Smart Boards can be used to reach all learners through student involvement.

"The Smart Board is a wonderful tool that combines the spontaneity of a chalkboard with the interactive ability of a touch screen computer. I have used the Smart Board to teach food webs, to identify the parts of a cell and to work genetic problems by completing Punnett Squares. When used as one of many different approaches for engaging students, the Smart Board enhances the learning experience through student involvement," she said.

Cahn said the La Plata science department shares one Smart Board and teachers rotate usage on a regular basis. Teachers can use Smart Boards with most software applications, such as Microsoft Office, and the Internet.

Teachers can create their own lesson plans for use with Smart Boards, or can download ideas from multiple Web sites.

Airliner tablets, or slates, are used interactively with Smart Boards, within a range of about 50 feet. They are Bluetooth wireless and run most software applications. Airliner tablets allow teachers to teach from any location in the classroom and students can interact with the Smart Board from their desk.

CCPS began to use airliner tablets during the 2005-06 school year, when North Point High School opened. Last school year, CCPS asked principals, administrative staff, teachers and instructional specialists to participate in Smart Board presentations with three Smart Board vendors to deter-

mine which company to contract. BJ Devkota, director of technology for CCPS, said it was important to gain input from those who would be using the technology.

The school system has purchased more than 290 Smart Boards, and has received another 17 through donations. The majority of schools have at least one to two Smart Boards and teachers rotate usage of them. Smart Boards are distributed to schools based on school priorities set by each school principal. The average cost for a Smart Board, including the stand, is about \$1,550. Airliner tablets retail for about \$349.

CCPS looking for outstanding teachers, nominations for Agnes Meyer award

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is accepting nominations for the *Washington Post's* 2009 Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Award. The annual award honors exemplary teachers who demonstrate excellence in teaching, encourage creative and quality instruction and contribute in a substantive way to the improvement of education.

Nominees must be full-time teachers in grades pre-kindergarten through 12 and have a minimum of five years teaching experience. Three of those years must have been with Charles County Public Schools and teachers, students, former students, administrators or community members may submit nominations. Teachers may not nominate themselves.

Nomination materials must include a minimum of four statements of support, one of which must be from a professional educator; a career summary; and a description of contributions in each of the nomination criteria categories.

Nominees must be teachers who:

- instill a desire in students to learn and achieve;
- understand the individual needs of students, encourage their talents and foster their self esteem;

- demonstrate a thorough knowledge of subject matter and the ability to share it effectively with students;
- foster cooperative relationships with their colleagues and the community;
- demonstrate outstanding leadership; and
- maintain their teaching position throughout the 2009-10 school year.

Charles County's Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Award recipient will be one of 21 recognized by the *Post* from the District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia.

Nominations are due Friday, Dec. 12. Materials should be sent to Barbara Palko, staff development resource teacher for Charles County Public Schools, Jesse L. Starkey Administration Building, P.O. Box 2770, La Plata, Md., 20646. Award recipients will be recognized and awarded \$3,000 at a ceremony in May.

The *Post* established the Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Awards in honor of Agnes Meyer, a supporter of public education who was the wife of Eugene Meyer, who purchased the *Post* in 1933.
