Wrestlers take top title

Congratulations to the La Plata High School wrestling team for earning the Maryland state title in the Class 4A/3A South region at the state dual meet held Feb. 12. The team earned first place with a score of 58 to 18 over Leonardtown High School of Calvert County. The team also earned first place in the Class 4A/3A South Regional tournament held Feb. 25-26. This is the third state dual meet title that the team has earned and the third regional tournament win that La Plata has achieved since 2006. Todd Sharp, a science teacher at La Plata and longtime wrestling coach, retires from his coaching career with a career dual meet record of 185-20 over an 11-year period.

PiSabatino named 2011 Principal of the Year

Each school day, William B. Wade Elementary School Principal Amy DiSabatino completes morning announcements by saying, "I am proud to be the principal of the Wade Wildcats."

This year, students, staff and parents let DiSabatino know how proud they are of her by nominating her for the *Washington Post* Distinguished Educational Leadership Award. Recently, the *Washington Post* announced that DiSabatino is this year's winner from Charles County, which also

makes her the 2011 Charles County Public Schools Principal of the Year.

"Mrs. DiSabatino is the key factor in making Wade a great school," Shane Blandford, first-grade teacher, wrote in a nomination letter.

DiSabatino is passionate about Wade, student learning and instruction. At Wade, students are excited about taking the Maryland School Assessment (MSA), a feeling they catch from their principal. At a recent gathering of fifth graders preparing to at-

tend MSA centers, DiSabatino let the children know how proud she was of them and told them she knew they were ready to succeed. Everything DiSabatino does, accord-

ing to staff, involves an instructional challenge or strategy. It's her leadership, according to staff, that helps Wade students rise to the top on state testing. Wade's MSA scores are consistently at or above 90 percent proficient with virtually no achievement gap.

"This award is very special to me because it brings recognition

to our extraordinary school and to the students, staff and community. I feel privileged to have the opportunity every day to work with my wonderful Wade family and to play a small part in helping to raise them to be successful," DiSabatino said.

Parents describe DiSabatino as a champion for student success and a principal who takes the time to communicate with parents. They say it is not surprising to see Mrs. D, as she is known, serving fries at McDonalds or selling tickets at the fall festival. She al-

Board votes to delay high school opening to 2014

The Board of Education on Monday voted to delay the opening of St. Charles High School until 2014.

The vote followed a weeklong review by the Board, including two work sessions and a meeting with the Charles County Commissioners to ask for funding.

Construction and annual operating costs are the center of discussions between the Board and the Charles County Commissioners. The Commissioners asked the Board to delay construction on the new high school from 2013 to 2014 so they are able to better handle the construction costs. On Monday, Board Chairman Roberta Wise said the Board had two options: delay the school for a year or stop the project. Opening in the year 2013 as planned was no longer an option. The Board voted 5-0, with two abstentions, to delay the opening. Voting for the delay were Wise, Vice Chairman Maura Cook, Michael Lukas, Pamela Pedersen and Donald Wade. Abstaining were Jennifer Abell and Patricia Bowie.

Last week, the Board met with the Commissioners to summarize issues and to ask the commissioners to consider and commit to the following:

- yearly operating costs of \$10 million;
- payment of construction cost increases caused by delaying the school opening for one year;
 - keeping the school design intact;

- additional funding to secure the construction site if project is delayed; and
- assurances to pay for emergency facility repairs needed for student safety if the school system changes its capital improvements plan to push out all other projects for five years.

At the meeting, and then in a March 28 letter to the Board, the Commissioners said they are 100 percent supportive of the high school and "We understand that it involves a commitment on our part to fund future opening costs. We will stand behind our commitment," the letter, which is signed by all five Commissioners, stated. The Commissioners then addressed each of the five points in general, only specifically guaranteeing that the school design would not change.

On the issue of operating costs, the Commissioners wrote, "As Boards, we will serve a four-year term together. We choose for that experience to be built on trust. We ask that you work with us to develop a plan for annual operating costs of the high school over the next three years while the building is under construction."

began her career with Charles County Public Schools in 2005. Born and raised in Ohio, Dutrow said she was excited to have the opportunity to start her career at a new high school and after visiting the area and meeting system staff, she and her spouse accepted positions and relocated to Maryland.

North Point Principal Kimberly Hill said it was during Dutrow's first year of teaching that she realized what a special teacher she had teaching in her school. "It was immediately apparent that she not only took her job very seriously, but that she wasn't afraid to show that she cares about her students. Students want to follow her lead because they know she expects them to be successful," Hill said in a nomination letter.

When she was notified that she had been selected as the award recipient, Dutrow said she was stunned and overwhelmed by the news. "I feel so honored - to receive this award is such an honor," she said. Now in her sixth year at North Point, Dutrow said each day of work is just as exciting as her first day. "Every day is so different in teaching. That is what makes it so exciting," she added.

Dutrow's choice of career paths has a lot to do with her love for dancing and reading. As a child, she began to take dance classes at a local studio, where she eventually was asked to come back and teach classes during her high school years and during her time in college. She said she knew from working with children that she wanted to

change her major in college to secondary education. It was also her love for novels such as "The Lord of the Flies" that fused her desire to teach English.

Her passion for teaching is also clear to her students. Devonte Thomas, a senior at North Point, credits Dutrow with molding him into a confident writer. "She wants you to be successful and to me this is everything an outstanding leader should be," Thomas wrote. North Point junior Tanner Morton said Dutrow has a unique way of catching and maintaining students' interests in class. "I remember her classes more than most because instead of just reading a book and doing a worksheet, we would have deep and interesting discussions in class and she always managed to keep us interested afterward," he wrote in a nomination letter.

Dutrow is also well known for choreographing musicals for the theater department, spring choir shows and routines for the school's pom pon squad. She earned her bachelor's degree in adolescent to young adult education with a focus in integrated language arts from the University of Akron in 2005, and will complete her master's degree in curriculum and instruction from McDaniel College in July. *The Post* will honor Dutrow during a reception later this spring. She will be recognized by the Board of the Education at their April meeting.

ways looks for ways to make parents feel like they are part of the school, parents say.

"Mrs. D. seems to know all the students in the school and the parents of each child as well. ... Whenever I have a question or concern, Mrs. D. responds promptly to my e-mail. She doesn't pass the buck

to a teacher or another administrator, but is always willing to take the time to address a parent's concerns directly," parent Pamela Green wrote.

In school, DiSabatino leads by modeling. It is common to see the principal at the front of the class demonstrating a lesson or strategy, combining student lessons with teacher training.

Staff members said DiSabatino is an exceptional principal with a high level of expectation for staff and students. Teachers and students describe her as a school leader who is enthusiastic, positive, flexible and inspiring and one who goes above and beyond to help students succeed.

"Mrs. DiSabatino is our best instructor and biggest cheerleader. She encourages us with a personal note, public announcement or a special treat," Deborah Williams, guidance counselor, wrote.

"I am quite humbled and very grateful to my staff for the nomination and very appreciative of all the support from the staff," DiSabatino said.

DiSabatino is a La Plata resident and a 24-year veteran of Charles County Public Schools who began her career in 1987 as a teacher

> at Walter J. Mitchell Elementary School. In 1995, DiSabatino was promoted to vice principal at Malcolm Elementary School where she served two years before being assigned as vice principal of Arthur Middleton Elementary School. She became principal of William B. Wade Elementary School in 2000. DiSabatino earned her bachelor of science in elementary education from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and her master's degree in administration and supervision from The George Washington University.

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Blast off this summer with space exploration classes

An early childhood space exploration class has been added to the summer Space Across the Curriculum class lineup this summer.

Taught by National Space Foundation instructors, the class centers on space and science education for early learners and provides early childhood educators tools to inspire young students through inquiry-based learning. Hands-on activities are specifically designed to instill the excitement of exploring the child's world and the wonderment of space and can be immediately used in the classroom, according to the Space Foundation's course description. The early childhood class is one of six offered free this summer.

Employees are urged to sign up now for classes, which begin the week of July 18. The Institute includes six weeklong sessions for teachers. In addition to the early childhood class, courses include rocketry, the biology of living in space, astronomy principles, space technologies and robots, the history and geology of Earth and long term space travel. The sessions are designed to give teachers across all content areas new tools to keep science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education interesting for students. Each project also models how teachers can incorporate different learning aspects into lessons.

Courses are open to all content area teachers from the three's program to grade 12. Graduate

credit is also available. The new early childhood class does not qualify for graduate credit; however, teachers are still able to get CPD credits.

Dates of classes are the weeks of July 18-22, July 25-29 and Aug. 1-5. Classes are held at Theodore G. Davis Middle School and are held 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Registration can be completed online at www2.ccboe.com/space foundation.cfm.

Charles County Public Schools is looking for award nominees for the annual Outstand-

ing Support Personnel Awards program. The awards recognize support personnel who exemplify excellence in their positions. Awards are given in the following areas: Outstanding Building Service Employee; Outstanding Food Service Employee; Outstanding Instructional Support Employee; Outstanding Maintenance Employee; and Outstanding Secretary.

To be eligible, employees must meet the following criteria: works full-time, has been employed by CCPS for a minimum of three years and in their nominated position for three years, and not have been a recipient of this award within the past five years.

Nomination materials must include a brief career summary, a description of contributions in nomination criteria areas and a minimum of three support statements. Teachers, students, colleagues, parents and administrators may make nominations. Nomination packets are due by Tuesday, May 3 and should be sent to the division of human resources.

The goals of the awards program are to recognize exemplary employees and to encourage support personnel to provide creative and quality services that support the schools and the school system. Award recipients will be announced and recognized by the Board of Education at their June 14 meeting.
