# St. Charles High School to open with grades 9, 10, 11

The Board of Education on Monday approved opening St. Charles High School as a partial high school with grades 9, 10 and 11 when it opens in August 2014. Seniors in the class of 2015 would finish and graduate from their current high school.

The decision eliminated three other opening options and allows the high school redistricting process to begin. The Board hopes to approve a final redistricting plan by June 2013, but the plan will not be implemented until August 2014 when the new high school opens. The high school redistricting will be comprehensive, establish an attendance zone for St. Charles High School, include review and alteration of attendance zones for all high schools and impact students who are now in grades 7, 8 and 9.

The plan, previously identified as Option 2, establishes an attendance zone for St. Charles High School and requires all students entering grades 9, 10 and 11 in 2014 to attend the new high school based on the new attendance boundaries. All rising seniors in the new attendance zone will remain at their current high school for their senior year and the school system will provide transportation.

The redistricting will also modify attendance zones for Henry E. Lackey High School, La Plata High School, Maurice J. McDonough High School, North Point High School, Thomas Stone High School and Westlake High School. Through redistricting, high school enrollments will be targeted to near state-rated capacity. The plan requires all students entering grades 9, 10 and 11 in August 2014 to attend the high school specified in the newly established attendance boundaries. Students entering grade 12 in August 2014 will remain at their current high school for their senior year.

In accepting Option 2, Board members said they felt it provides instant overcrowding relief at all high schools, especially North Point, and it does not disrupt seniors. Additionally, it opens St. Charles as a high school as intended and allows for growth.

staff members, on Wednesday, Sept. 19, as part of the Capitals Hockey School program. Hockey School is a free program, designed to be both instructional and interactive, with the goal of exposing students to floor hockey while teaching proper techniques.

Melissa Sopher, a physical education teacher at Henson, applied on the Capitals website for the program to provide her students with a "cool" opportunity to learn about a popular sport. "The visit was awesome because hockey isn't a sport you typically get into. Basketball and football are the main sports we always hear kids wanting to play. It is nice to hear them ask 'when do we get to play floor hockey?" Sopher said.

A group of 150 sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students were selected to participate in

the program. Sopher said she initially asked students who were interested in or play floor hockey to sign up for a "special opportunity" before she revealed that Capitals players were going to visit Henson. Students were also selected for demonstrating personal responsibility, positive behavior and school spirit. In preparation for the program, students created banners and posters to welcome the guests and hung them around the school's gymnasium.

Cote, who spent 19 seasons playing professional hockey for the National Hockey League and more than 10 years with the Capitals, started the hour-long session with a question and answer period with students. Rausse, who spent more than 15 years playing professional ice hockey and three seasons with the Capitals, and Cote then asked for student volunteers to help demonstrate basic hockey skills, including stick-handling, passing, puck-handling and shooting in front

The program concluded with several students participating in a scrimmage, with Cote and Rausse as their teammates, as well as Slapshot, the Capitals bird mascot. The scrimmage ended in a 1-1 tie, with Cote representing the boys' team and Rausse representing the girls' team. The Capitals alumni members said they had a great time with the students. "The kids were eager to play and practice all the pointers we gave them," Cote said. Rausse added that he enjoys being a part of the program because he sees the kids have fun and develop an interest in hockey.

As part of the visit, each participating student received an au-

and a Hockey School banner to display in the gymnasium. Sopher said the physical education department plans to put the equipment to good use. "The goalie equipment is a major plus for us. We are very thankful to have it in our equipment room. Now, we are better able to play a more active hockey game, knowing that the goalies have on full gear and are better protected," she added.

The 2012-13 season is the sixth consecutive year of the program, and the Capitals host two Hockey School visits each month between September and May. Since the program was launched in 2007, the Capitals have visited more than 70 schools in the Washington D.C. metropolitan-area. Schools are chosen on a first-come, firstserved basis.
