Rules about gifts for staff

All Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) employees, including teachers, are required to follow the Board of Education policy related to the acceptance of gifts. The policy prohibits employees from soliciting or accepting gifts from parents of students or from students where a conflict of interest may exist.

Teachers may accept unsolicited nominal gifts for holidays, birthdays, and teacher appreciation occasions according to the following guidelines — single gifts with a value of up to \$20 may be accepted; and a series of gifts may be accepted up to \$100 per year. The closure includes the Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) Jesse L. Starkey Administration Building.

Schools, offices and buildings reopen on Monday, Jan. 3, 2022, as noted in the Parent Handbook/Calendar.

Malcolm's Leedy earns MRSPA mini grant

Increasingly — and, some might argue, exclusively — people are communicating electronically. Text, email, social media — when it comes to writing to each other, people are talking with their thumbs. Emily Leedy, a fifth-grade teacher at Malcolm Elementary School, is attempting to change things up a bit by introducing a cross-curricular letter writing opportunity to fifth graders.

She will be helped in the endeavor with a \$300 mini grant from the Maryland Retired School Personnel Association (MRSPA). The grants help bring projects to classrooms and schools that might not be possible without the boost of the award.

The association's President George Denny Jr., and Wanda Ruffo Twigg, its executive director, attended a morning staff meeting earlier this month at Malcolm to award Leedy the grant. Denny said it was the program's simplicity that won over judges tasked to award mini grants to educators throughout the state.

"On the surface, it is so simple," Denny said. "But when you think about it, how many people write letters today? We all have cell phones, we all have computers, we all have Zoom. To take that very basic skill of writing a letter and make it beneficial to students is great."

Leedy plans to launch the pen pal-like program in early 2022. She was inspired by a practice she and a friend continue — they

send each other mail. She took that idea and will incorporate elements of the writing curriculum students delve into during fifth grade. "There is so much writing in fifth grade, and this will support writing standards," Leedy said. Students will pen draft copies, and revise and edit their work before putting a stamp on it and mailing it away.

The writing program also brings in a connection component. Leedy has reached out to peers in parts of the state beyond Southern Maryland to participate. By staying in the state, students are building off the knowledge they gained in fourth grade when they studied regions in Maryland.

The grant will cover postage and paper that is a step up from the standard notebook variety. Leedy, the team lead for fifth grade, said all students in Malcolm's fifth-grade classes will participate and likely start the program in February.

COVID-19 dashboard launches, features data by school, systemwide

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) launched a COVID-19 interactive data dashboard on the school system website last month at https://www.ccboe.com/index.php/covid-19-dashboard.

The dashboard features data on positive COVID-19 cases reported to CCPS from students and staff since the start of the 2021-2022 school year on Aug. 30.

Data includes cases reported to CCPS with a lab-confirmed positive result and is updated weekly on Fridays. Dashboard users can view data by date and school, center or CCPS building.

COVID-19 data is based upon the date the positive case was reported to CCPS. The information only reflects the raw number of cases reported to the CCPS Office of School Safety and Security.


The information cannot be used to determine when a positive person was last in a CCPS building or if the person was contagious in the building.

A video tutorial featuring a demonstration of how to use the dashboard is posted on the website.

The website also features a dashboard instruction sheet in both English and Spanish.

The website features a feedback form community members can use to help CCPS ensure the dashboard is user friendly.

The dashboard replaces the Charles County daily COVID-19 intel bulletin. Case notification letters will continue to be shared to affected



school communities as positive student and staff cases are identified.

The bulletin listed CCPS staff and student COVID-19 positive case data, but also data publicly reported by both the Maryland Department of Health and the Charles County Department of Health.

Virtual workshops connect parents, caregivers with mental health supports for children

The Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) Department of Student Services will host virtual parent and caregiver workshops next week.

Both virtual presentations will include an interpreter for Spanish-speaking parents and caregivers. The upcoming workshops will focus on coping strategies and healthy relationships among teens.

Student Services staff members — school counselors, school psychologists and pupil personnel workers — will continue to share information during the school year that mirrors social emotional learning (SEL) instruction students receive in their classes. Workshops will continue to help parents and caregivers gain knowledge of SEL information, strategies and coping skills students are taught. All virtual presentations will include an interpreter for Spanish-speaking parents and caregivers.

Topics for the secondary-level workshops will include depression, healthy relationships, healthy communication, stress management, life changes and adjustments.

Some of the topics for the elementarylevel workshops will include the alignment

of Move This World strategies, bullying and managing strong emotions.

Parents and caregivers must have an active Zoom account to participate.

A virtual workshop for parents of middleand high-school students will be 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., Dec. 13. Malik Williams, school counselor at Matthew Henson Middle School, will lead a discussion on coping strategies. Parents and caregivers will learn about coping strategies from the viewpoint of their child.

Parents and caregivers of middle and high school students are invited to attend a virtual workshop at 6:30 p.m., Dec. 15. Abby Pherson, school counselor at La Plata High School, will talk about healthy relationships. In the workshop, parents and caregivers will learn what makes healthy friendships from the viewpoint of teenagers. The workshop is designed to help parent/caregivers connect with their child as they learn how to determine if their friendships are healthy and what to do if they aren't.
