Take flight at North Point

Tonkins named director of transportation

Superintendent Maria V. Navarro, Ed.D., announced at the Aug. 22 Board of Education work session, the hiring of Jason Tonkins as the director of transportation. He is set to begin work with CCPS on Sept. 12.

Tonkins has more than 20 years of experience in operations and transportation management, most recently as transportation director of student transportation for the Department of For-Hire Vehicles for the Washington, D.C., government.

While there, he oversaw the daily transportation of special needs students in the District.

"The main characteristic that defines an excellent administrator is that of integrity," Tonkins said. "Doing the right thing, even when no one is looking. Keeping your people engaged in their work and helping them to grow in their careers defines the perfect plan of an administrator."

As director of transportation for CCPS, Tonkins will help oversee the school system's transportation department and a staff of bus drivers and bus attendants who safely transport 23,000 CCPS students to and from school each day.

Prior to joining the Department of For-Hire Vehicles, Tonkins was the senior operations manager for Envirosolutions Inc. where he led the operations teams and managed contracts with federal organizations such as the National Depart-

ment of Defense and the National Institutes of Health.

Tonkins has been a transportation logistics manager with the Close Up Foundation, a nonprofit in Alexandria, Va., and was the transportation supervisor with Southeastern Freight Lines in Greensboro, N.C.

It was in North Carolina where Tonkins attended college at the North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University in Greensboro, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in political science. He expects to earn his Master of Business Administration degree in November from Strayer University.

CCPS partners with Arts for Learning Maryland

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is partnering with Arts for Learning Maryland to bring arts-integrated learning experiences into the classrooms of elementary and middle school students. The artist-led programs will launch in schools during the 2022-2023 school year.

The three-year partnership ushers in more than 30 residencies, assemblies and professional development workshops from more than 15 Arts for Learning-trained teaching artists.

Teachers and CCPS staff will also have access to professional development programs led by artists in an effort to bring more creativity into classrooms.

"Now more than ever, our students need arts-integrated learning that develops each individual's social and emotional learning skills by developing their self-awareness, self-management, responsible decision-making, relationship skills and social awareness," Andrew Blumhardt, CCPS instruc-

tional specialist for fine and performing arts, said.

Arts in Learning Maryland — previously known as Young Audiences of Maryland — is part of the national Young Audiences Arts for Learning network which was founded in 1952 to inspire children to expand their learning through the arts, according to the nonprofit's website.

"We celebrate Charles County Public Schools for valuing arts education, and for making arts integration a high priority for their student's academic experience," Jessica Smith Hebron, chief program officer of Arts for Learning Maryland, said. "We look forward to providing dynamic and memorable educational arts experiences for the amazing students, teachers and artists who will participate in this multi-year partnership."



CCPS high school students place at ACT-SO



The following students placed in their respective categories.


