McGraw, Wilson reelected to Board leadership

The Board of Education of Charles County elected Virginia McGraw as its chairman and Latina Wilson as its vice chairman at the start of the Jan. 14 meeting. The Board votes annually in January to elect a chairman and vice chairman. Both the chairman and vice chairman serve a one-year term.

The current Board was elected to office in November 2018 and elected McGraw and Wilson as chair and vice chairman in January 2019. This is the fourth term for McGraw as chairman. McGraw was first elected to the Board in 2014 and is serving her second term on the Board. The vote for McGraw to continue as Board chairman was unanimous

McGraw thanked the Board for its support and said she excited to continue the work they started in 2018. "We have had a lot of challenges this year, but we have faced them together. I take my role as chair seriously and strive to be fair and honest. I wanted to be a Board member to be a part of the decision making process to do what is best for children. I will do my best to continue to represent what is best for our students," McGraw said.

Wilson was elected in November 2018 to her first term on the Board. She now begins her second term as vice chairman and said she is excited to continue her work on behalf of students. The Board voted 4 to 3 to reelect Wilson to the role of vice chairman. "This has been an amazing opportunity. Our kids are absolutely amazing. I have taken every opportunity to be out and about in Charles County public schools. The privilege [in serving as vice chairman] has been mine," Wilson said.

McGraw is a retired Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) principal who also served as a teacher and vice principal during her 25-year career with the school system. She was the 2009 CCPS Principal of the Year, and volunteers with Our Lady Help of Christians Catholic Church. She is an elected member of the board of directors of the Maryland Association School Boards. She is also a member of the Charles County Retired School Personnel Association, the Education Association of Charles County and the Maryland State Education Association. She earned her bachelor's degree in elementary special education and her master's degree in spe-

cial education. McGraw has lived in the Charles County community for more than 40 years.

Wilson is a Gulf War veteran who retired from the U.S. Army after serving for 20 years. Second annual Career Fair set for March 21

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is hosting its second annual Career Fair Saturday, March 21 at North Point High School in Waldorf. The fair is set for 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and sponsored by the CCPS Career and Technical Education (CTE) department. The event is free and open to the public, but targets high school students interested in exploring local career opportunities available after graduation.

CCPS students can show school ID badges for discounts

Local businesses are giving Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) students incentives to wear their identification badges in school and keep track of the badges out of school by providing discounts for services and products.

CCPS began issuing student identification badges during the 2018-19 school year as part of a safety and security pilot program intended to enhance school security. The program started with three schools and extended this school year to all high schools and five middle and elementary schools.

Next school year, CCPS will require students at all schools to wear ID badges.

Student ID badges, said Jason Stoddard, director of school safety and security, keep students and staff safer while they are at school. ID badges help students and staff tell at a glance who does or does not belong in the school. All CCPS staff members already wear employee identification badges. "In case of an emergency, it is imperative we be able to identify both students and staff in a timely manner," Stoddard said.

Schools provide a number of benefits to students for wearing their badges, including checking out library books and paying for school meals. Stoddard said results from the three pilot schools were positive, and showed that tying ID badges to products or services motivated students to wear them.

"Extending the use of student ID badges to include benefits both inside and outside of school is the next step as we prepare to require the mandatory use of student identification badges to all CCPS schools in 2020-21," Stoddard said.
