### High School Assessment scores continue to rise

Far more Charles County Public Schools students passed the High School Assessments in 2006 than in any past year. Charles County students posted significant gains on the algebra, biology and government assessments, which are a graduation requirement for students in the class of 2009 and beyond.

Results of the High School Assessments, taken by students during the 2005-06 school year, show that 73.1 percent passed the algebra/data analysis test; 69.2 percent passed the biology test; and 77 percent passed the government test. The Maryland State Board of Education will release English 2 assessment scores and Adequate Yearly Progress information for high schools later in the fall.

Overall results include: students in middle school and grade nine who must pass the tests to graduate; and students in grades 10, 11 and 12 who do not need to pass the tests to graduate.

Results of the algebra test, which is both a high school assessment and fulfills the federal mathematics requirement as part of No Child Left Behind, show an increase of 20 percent, up from 53 percent the previous year. Additionally, the number of students who passed is even higher for students in grades 6-9, who must pass the test to graduate. The pass rate for students in grades 6-9 is 85.1 percent. According to MSDE, early numbers indicate that small numbers of students approaching the senior year will still need to pass HSAs.

Students also posted significant gains in biology and government. Biology scores increased 10.2 percent from 59 percent in 2005 to 69.2 percent in 2006. Typically, Charles County Public Schools students take biology in tenth grade, meaning the test becomes a graduation requirement for this year's rising sophomore class. A 14 percent gain was posted in government, with scores rising from 63 percent in 2005 to 77 percent in 2006. Most Charles County students take government in the ninth grade. The pass rate for students in the class of 2009 and beyond, who must pass in order to graduate, is 78.5 percent.

Student success is across the spectrum. Students in each racial subgroup, as specified by NCLB, increased scores. African American students made the largest gains in algebra, increasing scores from 37.6 percent in 2005 to 62.4 percent in 2006. White students increased scores from 65.7 percent to 83.1 percent and Hispanic students increased from 52.7 percent to 66.7 percent. Asian/Pacific Islander students increased scores from 75.4 percent to 84 percent and American Indian/Alaskan Native students went from 38.5 percent passing in 2005 to 83.3 percent.

Superintendent James E. Richmond said he is encouraged by the large gains in the scores and attributes the increase in algebra scores to a number of instructional programs and strategies. Charles County Public Schools has double periods for Algebra I; developed prescribed lessons for summer academies and students needing additional help; provided laptop-based Algebra I programs for middle and high school teachers; and extended training programs to provide additional support for beginning teachers.

Richmond said staff has started identifying students in the class of 2009 who must pass the assessments as a graduation requirement and need additional help. Remediation options have been developed to help students who were not successful on the assessment.

## SAT scores above state, nation

Charles County Public Schools average score on the SAT, a nationally known college entrance test, is 1537, which is above state and national averages.

Students' average in the mathematics section of the test is 515, the average score in the writing section is 510 and the average score on the critical reading portion is 512. The format of the SAT changed last year to include the addition of third-year college preparatory math, more critical reading and a new writing section. SAT tests are designed to demonstrate to colleges a student's mastery of certain subjects.

Charles County's score is 26 points above the state average of 1511 and 19 points above the national average of 1518. Only scores for graduating seniors are included in the 2006 report. Students in the class of 2006 were offered more than \$40 million in scholarships, up from \$32 million the previous year.

Maurice J. McDonough High School was the highest performing school with a score of 1602. La Plata High School students posted an average score of 1596 and Westlake High School students' average score is 1554. Thomas Stone students posted a 1527 average and Lackey students averaged 1417.

"This year's scores continue our trend of remaining above the state and national averages, which is our ultimate goal. This is the seventh consecutive year that our students have outpaced these averages, and I commend the students and staff at the high schools for their continued efforts in this area. This was a new test last year, and I am pleased with the preparation offered to students and their performance on this test. We know that scores are going to fluctuate from year to year, but it is imperative that we continue to offer a strong academic program and a consistent SAT preparation program systemwide," said Superintendent James Richmond.

### Sign up for direct deposit

Sign up for direct deposit to make sure your paycheck is deposited into your bank on time. In case of bad weather, sickness or leave, mailed checks may be delayed.
