Cisco recognizes school system, Richmond

Education leaders, legislators, educators and administrators met May 23 to showcase accomplishments and share ideas about how technology is changing today's learning environment. Cisco awarded Charles County Public Schools two awards for exceptional leadership (see related story).

Education Day was sponsored by Cisco and held at North Point High School.

The day-long event was launched with the awards and a round-table discussion, facilitated by Woody Sessoms, vice president at Cisco, and focused on 21st Century learning and the impact of technology. The panel included Superintendent James E. Richmond, along with Maryland State Superintendent of Schools Nancy S. Grasmick, Mississippi Hattiesburg District Superintendent Annie Wimbish; and Partnership for 21st Century Skills Member Ken Kay.

Additionally, attendees were provided a virtual tour of Butch Arbin's rocketry class at Matthew Henson Middle School and a tour of North Point.

Awards honor educational leadership

Charles County Public Schools received two educational and leadership awards from Cisco Systems at Cisco Education Day on Wednesday, May 23, at North Point High School.

The first award, the Cisco 21st Century School Award, was presented to CCPS to recognize North Point High School as a 21st century model school. The second award, the Outstanding Vision and Leadership Award, was presented to Superintendent of Schools James E. Richmond.

The Cisco 21st Century School award was created to recognize schools that have demonstrated exceptional leadership and adaptability in transforming education to reflect the needs of the 21st century. This is the first time that Cisco has conferred this award.

Retirement contributions

The employee's contribution to the Maryland State Retirement Agency for the teacher's retirement plan increases to 4 percent on July 1, 2007, and 5 percent on July 1, 2008. The deduction for retirement is made over 20 paychecks from September to June. The employee's contribution for the classified retirement plan is 5 percent and is deducted over 26 paychecks.

Employee portal

The employee self-service portal now has employee check information when payroll is processed, which is usually available one week prior to the issuance of the paycheck or direct deposit. To access the Employee Self Serve Portal:

- Log on to a CCPS computer located in your school or building
 - Go to http:/www2.ccboe.com
- On the right in blue, find and click on Staff Services.
- The first item in the middle of the Staff Services page is Employee Self Service Portal. Click on the words underlined (Employee Self Service).
- You will get a security alert; click okay.
- Another security alert will pop up; click the box marked yes.
- Log in with your employee identification number.
- Use the last four digits of your Social Security number as the pin.

State recognizes Charles County for minority achievement

A Charles County Public Schools student and an administrator joined a local sorority as honorees April 20 at the Maryland Excellence for Minority Achievement Awards recognition ceremony. Sponsored by the Maryland State Department of Education Achievement Initiative for Maryland's Minority Students (AIMMS), the awards honor those who have demonstrated outstanding leadership in promoting student excellence through equity in education.

Four Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) principals have announced they will resign or retire at the end of this school year. Leaving are Peter Cevenini, Susan Fowler, Sylvia Lawson and Kristin Shields.

Cevenini, principal at North Point High School, has announced his resignation. Cevenini, who began with CCPS in 1989 and opened North Point in 2005, has taken a position as director for K-12 Education for Cisco's Internet Business Solutions.

Fowler, who has served as principal of Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer Elementary School for 10 years, is retiring from CCPS. She has accepted a position as principal of Lexington Park Elementary School in St. Mary's County.

Lawson has served CCPS for more than 20 years and most recently as principal of Benjamin Stoddert Middle School. Calvert County Public Schools has announced that Lawson was appointed as vice principal at Patuxent High School in Lusby.

Four listed in top 1,200 AP high school list

Newsweek honored four CCPS high schools this week for their efforts in encouraging students to take the most rigorous courses they can handle and their efforts in the area of Advanced Placement classes.

Maurice J. McDonough High School, La Plata High School, Thomas Stone High School and Westlake High School were ranked in the top 1,200 U.S. Schools listed in *Newsweek Magazine* for their performance in the area of encouraging students to take Advanced Placement courses as well as the accompanying exam. Public schools are ranked according to a ratio, devised by Jay Mathews of the *Washington Post*, which is the number of Advanced Placement and/or International Baccalaureate tests taken by all students at a school in 2006 divided by the number of graduating seniors. All of the schools on the list have an index of at least 1.000; they are in the top 5 percent of public schools measured.

According to a report by the Alliance for Excellent Education, there are more than 17,500 public high schools in the United States and approximately 65 percent of U.S. public schools offer AP courses.

"We believe that it is important for students to challenge themselves and to take the highest-level courses possible. We commend these principals for encouraging their students to maximize their potential and their learning experiences," said Superintendent James E. Richmond.
