

Lead in Drinking Water – Public and Nonpublic Schools

Important Notice: Water Sample Results

Theodore G. Davis Middle School

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) tests all schools for the presence of lead in school drinking water to comply with a state regulation requiring lead testing of drinking water outlets in all Maryland schools.

On April 11, 2019, 38 lead water samples were collected from Theodore G. Davis Middle School. All of Davis's samples were compliant with state regulations, and none of the samples showed lead exceeding the action level of 20 parts per billion (ppb) for lead in drinking water in school buildings. The action level is the concentration of lead, which, if exceeded, triggers required remediation.

A sample test of water in the boiler room tested at 30.4 ppb, however the water at that fixture is not for consumption or for any use other than draining the water system.

Next steps

No remediation is necessary at Davis since all samples were compliant with state regulations.
